It has been nearly two months since the last edition of Forest & Fables at Walter Scott and a busy two months it has been! During March and April we have served over 1,000 meals from our kitchen, had over 250 nights of usage by guests, and 12 different fishing groups began to get nibbles on their lines in the lake. Our geothermal system has been fully installed into the Retreat House and the wells and lines have been ran for our remaining buildings as we convert them before the end of the decade. At the same time the goats have continued to clear invasive brush as we've begun working on dead-hedge to serve as some fencing.

As we look ahead, we are quickly approaching camp season! Memorial Day Weekend Family camp will be here in a little under a month followed by our service week and then four weeks of youth camps in June and July. Our other weekend youth camps will lead us into August before Labor Day Weekend Family Camp takes us into September. We are excited for all the ways in which God will move as Spirit during these camps and the opportunities afforded by this Holy Ground. We can't wait to share some of those stories with you later this year.

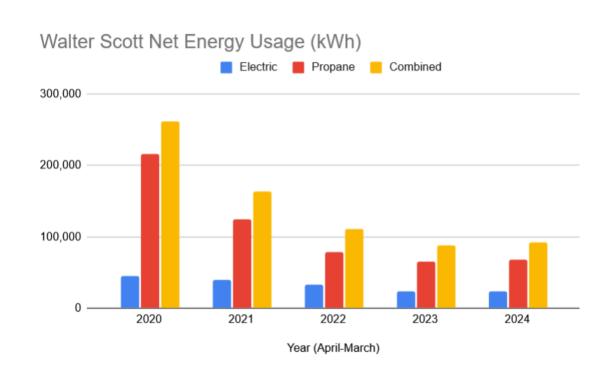

We have updated the back office in our main building into another apartment space! This will allow us to sleep more guests, house more volunteers during camps, and create more individual spaces for retreats and reflection. We are excited for the ways in which this will enable us to continue to live into collaboration with more people and authentically live out our hospitality.

Conservation & Caring Gently for God's Creation



At Walter Scott, we continue to do our best to care gently for God's Creation, and reducing our energy usage is a keystone practice in our endeavor. Tracking our utility bills over the past five years, we are able to tell a story of reducing facility energy usage by 66% in the same period we have seen an increase in total overnight stays, total meals served, and total numbers of visitors to the grounds. Propane usage has decreased nearly 70% and net electric is down nearly 50%. To be clear, this data reflects no appliances being converted from gas to electric, but a holistic approach to energy conservation as well as the installation of our first solar array. Let's dive in to all the changes that added up to make this picture (and which you can do at your church, business, non profit organization, home, or anywhere!)

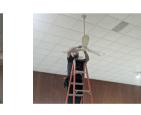

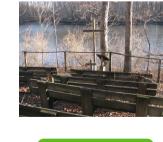
Waste and Witness: A Family Learns Creation Care By Rev. April McClure-Stewart
