Our New Dock





Starting last winter, we have been working towards a refresh of our beach swimming area and we were happy in August to kick our plans off in earnest with the removal of the old swimming dock and professional installation of the new! The old dock was 4' wide with a 12'x8' swimming platform at the end, while this new dock is 6' wide with a 12'x20' swimming platform at the end. Additionally, instead of the 4"x4" wood posts used in the old dock and wooden superstructure, the new dock has 7" steel and concrete pylons with a steel super structure. This should ensure this new structure lasts for decades to come and that the wooden top can be replaced several times before the structure itself needs replaced. The land portion is being constructed at our upcoming workdays with more improvements to the beach area as well! Make certain to visit soon to experience it for yourself!

Meet the Neighbors!



Meet another one of our neighbors, Castor Canadensis. Castor Canadensis (or the North American Beaver) is one of the residents in Lake Walter Scott and a vitally important species. While they do indeed gnaw on trees and they do eat fish and other animals within the lake, this isn't necessarily a bad thing. They act as a keystone species, changing the landscape and geography of where they reside to make new habitats for even more species to move into. By creating dams and altering water flows, they create more wetlands. This in turn continues the cycle of flourishing as these new habitats and biodiversity create more of the same. Who would have guessed a rodent who have such a big and beneficial impact? As stewards of God's Creation, we can only properly care for what we know, and a great place to start is learning a bit about a keystone species.
